

The Buckthorn Slayers of Carlington!

Friends of Carlington Woods have been clearing invasive buckthorn for the last several weeks. A huge thank you to all the volunteers – it has been a tremendous undertaking and we're not done yet!

We've planted native wildflowers and a cedar tree near the opening to the Woods off Clyde Avenue, and next spring we'll begin planting native shrubs and trees where we've removed the buckthorn.

A special project for Hampton

Alan Sunter was a Hampton Park regular, often spotted along the creek path walking his dogs, and always with a smile on this face.

Over time, he found it more difficult to walk the dogs, especially when there was nowhere to sit and recover his energy.



When Alan passed in 2023, his family approached the National Capital Commission (NCC) with a donation specifically for Hampton Park in his honour.

With the help of several NCC staff members, the Friends of Hampton Park and the Sunter family devised a plan that will regenerate the eroded slope with native shrubs and trees, and provide seating along the path.

On October 3, the NCC will deliver the vegetation, volunteers will plant, install a regeneration sign, and arrange some temporary stump seats.* Later, we'll install the memorial sign with the Sunter family.

*Rain date October 4. The NCC will provide two of their red Muskoka chairs for the area for three seasons, beginning in the spring of 2025.

Other Projects

Hampton Trail System

The ecologist who conducted the baseline study of the Hampton Woods (2020) recommended that the number of unofficial trails in the Woods be reduced by at least 50%. This November, Friends of Hampton Park will install a trail system, starting in the south Hampton Woods. The picture is a mock up only. The system will include easy to see markers, posts, farmtype fencing, signage and other messaging that provides more information about this urban forest.







Pollinator Gardens

The pollinator gardens at Hampton and Carlington are still blooming with many aster and goldenrod species providing excellent nutrition for all kinds of animals and insects as they head into fall and winter.
